

## George Martin Retires as Christian City's COO



Christian City COO George Martin is taking another shot at retirement, ending his years of stellar service this month. He arrived on campus 15 years ago as a "special assistant" to then-president Bob Crutchfield. His timing was just right as Christian City began

expanding and growing – and George shepherded the organization through many changes and three CEO transitions.

As chief operating officer, George has been responsible for overseeing the maintenance, improvements and usage of all campus facilities. He has been a most effective advocate for Christian City, particularly in Fayette County and with the Union City mayor's office.

"Throughout his tenure, George has been a pillar of leadership, driving operational excellence, fostering innovation, and strengthening our organizations' culture," said CEO Keith Horton. "Under his guidance, we have achieved remarkable milestones, expanded our reach, and enhanced our efficiency, setting new standards for success."

George points to the expansion of Hill Top Acres neighborhood as perhaps his favorite project: "it

not only provides much-needed senior housing but also is a selfsustaining business model. It serves a



very important purpose, in a Christian environment and will be self-supporting financially for decades to come."

When asked what he has learned from the people he has served, George said, "there are so many nice people here that are from my generation or older who are teaching me how to "age gracefully." That is not necessarily true in the "outside world." Christian City is a unique place and attracts very nice people. That is true of both residents and staff."

George came to Christian City, he likes to say, because he'd "flunked" retirement. Having retired from a long, successful career with the US Postal Service, he'd gotten bored and returned to working life. His "boredom" has been Christian City's blessing. In turn we wish him a successful retirement this go-round.


George has a clear view of a "successful" retirement: "Staying busy with a wide variety of community programs providing service to others. My Mother lived to be 90 and my Dad to 94. They both stayed active and busy till the end so I'm going to try to do the same."

#### Meet the New COO

Always keeping Christian City's successful operation at the forefront, George announced his retirement months ahead so that he could help transition to a new COO. In April, after a national search, CEO Keith Horton announced that Mark Sexton had been chosen to succeed George. Mark began work on April 27 and has been shadowing George since.

Mark is a retired US Army Officer with over 25 years of service, primarily as an army aviator. During his military career, he gained invaluable leadership experience through multiple combat deployments, formal training, and hands-on leadership development. He was most recently the Deputy Director at the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency (GEMA/HS), where he has worked for eight years.



Mark has deep personal ties to Christian City, as his father was a Southern Baptist Minister and Director of Missions for the area, and Mark grew up attending services and worshipping with the residents. With a career dedicated to service, Mark has spent his professional life helping people recover after challenging events. He sees this opportunity with Christian City as a chance to use his skills in a new way, applying his leadership and organizational abilities in a ministry role.



# The Chaplain's Office

Father's Day, the third Sunday in June, is a special occasion set aside to honor and celebrate fathers and father figures for their guidance, strength, and love. It is also a time to give thanks to God for the gift of fatherhood and to encourage fathers and mentors in their calling.

The first known Father's Day celebration occurred in Spokane, Washington, in 1910. It was spearheaded by Sonora Smart Dodd, who wanted to honor her father, William Jackson Smart - a Civil War veteran and single parent who raised six children after the death of his wife. Inspired by a Mother's Day sermon, Dodd proposed the idea of a day to honor fathers, and she chose June 19, 1910, her father's birthday month.

The Bible speaks extensively about the role of a father, offering both instructions and examples. From the Old Testament to the New, fatherhood is portrayed as a divine responsibility—marked by love, discipline, guidance, and reflection of God's own character.

Throughout Scripture, God is portrayed as a provider, protector, and guide—the ultimate model of fatherhood. Psalm 103:13 says: "As

a father shows compassion to his children, so the Lord shows compassion to those who fear him."



This divine fatherhood forms the ideal toward which all earthly fathers are called. Though no human father is perfect, the example of God's character sets the standard.

For those who have lost their fathers, or whose relationships are strained, this day can also be one of healing. Remembering God's unfailing fatherhood can bring comfort and perspective. As Psalm 68:5 says: "Father of the fatherless and protector of widows is God in his holy habitation."
